Broadening the Worldview: Broadening the students' worldview by providing diverse and rich courses as well as establishing international academic exchange activities.</li> <li>3. Improving the Logical Thinking: Inspiring the students' analytical and critical capabilities while also enhancing their expression ability as well as communication skills.</li> <li>4. Providing the Professional Knowledge: Sequentially enriching the students' knowledge on foreign literature (notably English and American literature), culture studies, arts, second language acquisition, and interdisciplinary language studies by providing diverse, rich, and professional literary/linguistic courses.</li> <li>5. Course Regulations	<p>1 All students shall obtain at least 28 credits on general education (excluding the four [4] credits of Physical and Health Education Programs).</p> <p>2 Students taking any general education courses shall comply with the regulations and descriptions stated in the “General Education Program Structure” of the university. For further details, please refer to the “General Education Related Regulations” under the “Guidelines for Course Selection” tab of the “Regulations” section at the university’s Office of Academic Affairs front page.</p> <p>3 All students shall obtain at least 55 credits on professional compulsory courses (excluding the four [4] credits of English Reading (I) and Freshman English (II))</p> <p>4 All students shall obtain at least 30 credits on elective programs established by the department. Second language programs may be regarded as departmental electives under the condition that only a maximum of six (6) shall be accounted for. Computer and management courses are not included in the departmental electives.</p> <p>5 Table of Professional Compulsory Courses:  Group A: English Literature (select any two [2] from the four [4] provided courses)  Group B: American Literature (select any one [1] from the two [2] provided courses)  Group C: European Literature (select any one [1] from the two [2] provided courses)  Group D: Second Language Programs (select one [1] from the 30 provided courses)</p> <p>6 Graduation requirements in the English field:</p> <p>6.1 All students shall pass any one [1] of the English proficiency tests listed below during the study period so as to be eligible for graduation.</p> <p>A. GEPT Advanced listening and reading tests  B. TOEFL ITP 550  C. TOEFL iBT 79  D. IELTS 6  E. TOEIC 800</p> <p>6.2 Students who fail to pass any of the tests aforementioned shall either continue to take the test till success or take any one (1) of the departmental courses listed below while also fulfilling the related requirements as an alternative.</p> <p>A. Advanced English Reading (I)  B. Advanced English Reading (II)  C. English Speech and Debate  D. Applied English and Communication</p> <p>The credits of the above-mentioned courses shall not be included in the minimum credits required for graduation.</p> <p>6.3 All foreign students who come from English-speaking countries (e.g., the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Ireland, and South Africa), speak English as mother language, and have scored 850 (or above) in the English proficiency test held by the department during the enrollment shall be regarded as having passed the graduation requirement in English field.</p> <p>7 Students from foreign countries, Hong Kong, and Macao whose graduating year is equivalent to the second grade of domestic senior high schools and whose graduating schools are comparable in level and nature to domestic senior high schools shall obtain an extra twelve (12) credits in addition to the minimum credits required for graduation.</p>
